Ways We Help

Assessing Community Needs by:

- Collecting existing data to better inform ourselves and our partners about existing conditions in our community.

Planning by:

- *Coordinate the Substance Abuse Prevention education efforts within the county*



Highlights and Accomplishments

In 2017, the FRN generated \$96,843.00 to support community programs and services and assisted other local organizations in securing an additional \$123,000. In-kind investments through volunteers and local donations totaled \$47,141.86.

Overview of Randolph County

Randolph County encompasses 1,040 square miles in the eastern mountains of West Virginia. There are 28,006 people residing in the county, a 1.4% decline in population since 2010. 11,563 households are found in the county with an average household size of 2.35 persons.

The Randolph County population is predominantly white (96.8%), with 1.6% black and 1.6% of other races. 19.1% of the population is under the age of 18 years and 20.8% are 65 yrs. of age or older. 5.4% of the population are children under 5 yrs. of age.



Among persons 25 yrs. of age or older, 83.9% are high school graduates and 19.3% are college graduates. Median household income (2015 the state average of \$41,751. The poverty rate in Randolph County is 19.8% which exceeds the state average of 17.9% of the population. 12.8% of the population of the county under age 65 yrs. have a disability and 8.2% of the population under age 65 yrs. are without any type of health insurance. 52.2% of persons 16 yrs. of age and older are in the labor force.

72.9% of households are home owners and the median value of owner occupied housing is \$101,200. The median monthly owner cost for homeowners with a mortgage is \$851, and the median cost of home ownership without a mortgage is \$293. Median gross rent in Randolph County is \$560.
